
RECOMMENDED READING FOR GHANA



- If you are interested in cultural and political conditions in Ghana, consider Ashesi Professor Dr. Nana Apt's book Learning How to Play to Win: What Has 50 Years of Independence Brought Ghana?
- For more Ghanaian literature, Nana Apt also recommended two books by Marilyn Heward Mills, an emerging author whose two publications are based on historical moments in Ghana Cloth Girl and Association of Foreign Spouses.

- **Bright Lights, No City** by M. Alexander is a fast, funny, and easy read. It captures the hundreds of quirky details that add up to the big picture.
- Homegoing: A novel by Yaa Gyasi is a "family saga [that] encompasses seven generations of descendants of a Fante and his captured Asante house slave", and was named one of Time's Top 10 Novels of 2016.
